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Montana Supports Transmission Competition - Clearing the Way for Lower Electricity Prices

WASHINGTON – Montana has officially repealed a law that gave monopoly utilities the exclusive right to build new power lines across a huge swath of the state—an area nearly the size of Indiana. This major win for consumers means more competition, more accountability, and lower prices in the state's electricity grid.

The Right of First Refusal (ROFR) repeal impacts 46,000 square miles of service territory held by Montana-Dakota Utilities (MDU), a publicly traded utility. That territory, along with Northwestern Energy's, is now open to competition from non-utility developers. Only one cooperative area, Basin Electric, still retains a ROFR.

In a statement, Paul Cicio, Chair of the Electricity Transmission Competition Coalition, said: "This is a big win for Montana families and manufacturers. Without competition, monopoly electric utilities do not have an incentive to reduce costs that are passed onto consumers. Repealing ROFR opens the door to lower cost, competitively built projects, and that's exactly what we need to rein in soaring electricity prices."

Across the country, states are waking up to the cost burden created by ROFR laws. Both the Trump and Biden administration's US Department of Justice have consistently weighed in against ROFR laws. Below are two US DOJ quotes.

- "...these restrictions would limit competition, thereby, potentially raising prices and lowering the quality of service for electricity consumers."
- "...such laws can similarly reduce competition and, thereby, harm consumers."
